


Public Health District Profile and Outcomes

Maine's 7th Public Health District is Downeast, and includes Hancock and Washington Counties. The Downeast District has an estimated population of 86,408 (Hancock: 54,483, Washington: 31,925) and includes 83 municipalities. The median household incomes are \$50,037 (Hancock) and \$39,469 (Washington) with 12.1% and 18.0% of individuals living in poverty, respectively.



Smoke and Tobacco-Free Policies Implemented:

Behavioral Health: 1 policy passed for an organization with 8 employees serving 360 clients.

Hospital: 1 policy passed for a hospital with 500 employees and 25 patient beds.

<u>Lodging:</u> 1 policy passed for an establishment with 7 guest rooms and 5 employees.

Municipalities: 4 policies passed for municipalities with a combined population of 6,882 and 48 employees.

Schools: 2 policies passed for schools with 909 enrolled students and 129 employees.

Youth-Serving Entities: 6 policies passed for organizations serving 94 youth and with 20 employees.
