Tobacco Use Disorder - DSM 5

A problematic pattern of tobacco use leading to clinically significant impairment or distress, as manifested by at least two of the following, occurring within a 12-month period:

- 1. Loss of control (inability to stop using)
- Persistent desire/unsuccessful efforts to stop using
- 3. Craving (a strong desire to use the substance)
- 4. Failure to fulfill major role obligations due to use
- 5. A great deal of time is spent obtaining, using, and recovering from the use of substances
- Continued use of substances despite having social or interpersonal problems caused or made worse by the use
- 7. Important activities are reduced or given up because of the use
- 8. Substance use in situations where it is physically hazardous
- Continued use of substances despite having physical or psychological caused or made worse by the use
- 10. Tolerance
- 11. Withdrawal

Tobacco Withdrawal - DSM 5

- A. Daily Use for at least several weeks.
- B. Abrupt cessation of tobacco use, or reduction in the amount of tobacco used, followed within 24 hours by four (or more) of the following signs and or symptoms:
 - 1. Irritability, frustration, or anger
 - 2. Anxiety
 - 3. Difficulty concentrating
 - 4. Increased appetite
 - 5. Restlessness
 - 6. Depressed mood
 - 7. Insomnia
- C. Signs or symptoms cause clinically significant distress or impairment
- D. The signs or symptoms are not attributed to another medical condition or disorder
