## MAKING SPACE FOR A TOBACCO FREE SPACE (GALLERY)

Maine Tobacco Prevention Success Story

## **AT A GLANCE**

Every June, the celebration of Pride is an excellent opportunity for Portland Public Health to build connections with our local intentional lesbian, gay, bisexual, and trans (LGBT) organizations and businesses. On June 25th, SPACE Gallery, a nonprofit gallery focused on providing intentionally inclusive and smoke-free spaces to exhibit art, adopted a more comprehensive tobacco policy that covers their gallery and all their community functions, reaching a whopping 32,000 patrons annually!

PUBLIC HEALTH CHALLENGE

SPACE Gallery's focus on amplifying the voices of Portland's LGBT community, as well as the voices of Portland's black, Indigenous and people of color (BIPOC) makes SPACE an especially meaningful partner for tobacco prevention. Although cigarette smoking has declined significantly since 1964, wide disparities in tobacco use have been documented among the largest U.S. racial/ethnic groups and within the LGBT community. According to the U.S. CDC, racial and ethnic minorities and LGBT individuals throughout the United States experience disproportionally higher rates of illness and death across a wide range of health conditions. To combat these disparities, community health workers must explicitly make the effort to engage BIPOC and LGBT organizations and businesses and involve them with promoting wellness promote through integrated approaches, evidence-based programs and best practices to reduce health disparities.

## **APPROACH**

In June 2021, Portland Public Health extended an invitation for SPACE Gallery to participate in our PPH Pride Passport Program, which highlights local tobacco-free LGBT spaces. After accepting the invitation to participate in our Pride celebrations, Joselyn, the Office Manager at SPACE Gallery, opted to go a step further and adopt a more comprehensive tobacco policy for their brick-and-mortar gallery and all their events and exhibits throughout the community!
